## IDEAS TO IMPROVE CHILDREN'S

LANGUAGE Skills



#### **USE WORDS IN CONTEXT**

When introducing a new word, try using sight, sounds, smells, taste, and touch! Showing a YouTube video of a panda and feeling a furry blanket will help children understand "panda" more than describing it with words. Be sure to practice these new words so they stick!

#### **READ TO CHILDREN DAILY**

Reading is one of the best ways to introduce children to language in an engaging way. Head to your library and let your child pick out some books to read together! Take time to explain any new words. **BONUS:** Ask questions and talk about the book with one another!

#### **GO ON ADVENTURES**

A trip to the park or the museum offers a ton of opportunities to learn new words that you might not encounter at home! New plants, animals, objects, and experiences can enrich brain development and inspire creative thinking.

#### HAVE CONVERSATIONS

Back-and-forth conversations give children a chance to practice their language, even if they're just babbling! Ask open-ended questions, listen to what they are saying and respond to it, and use these opportunities to introduce new words, phrases, and ideas!

#### **BE EXPRESSIVE!**

Many words have emotions tied to them. By showing excitement and a smile when using the word "joyful," or looking sad when using the word "disappointment," for example, you can help children understand the word's meaning using emotions.
